


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


## RTK Photography Contest Winners Announced

### Conservation Grants Awarded to RTK

Recently, the Ranchland Trust Kansas and their community. of Kansas (RTK) was awarded \$100,000 from Playa Lakes Joint Venture's (PLJV) ConocoPhillips Capacity Grant program to support the launch of a four-year project in western Kansas to educate ranchers on conservation easements. RTK was recently the recipient of two additional grants to make the gram, allows NRCS to leverage project possible.

North American Wetlands Conservation Act (NAWCA) and a grant from the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) by the Conservation Collaboration Grants or Agreements (CCGA) program.

Ducks Unlimited (DU) played a valuable role to help earmark NAWCA funds to secure at least one conservation easement with RTK in western Kansas as part of the PLIV conservation initiative.

Hough said, "Within the partnership of these great organizations, we can assist in restoration, habitat improvements and payment for the easement through NAWCA."

The next grant RTK received, thanks to the progressive approach of NRCS through the CCGA profunding with private partner re-RTK received a grant from the sources increasing the overall success in achieving mutual goals of protecting and conserving agricultural lands.

> "NRCS is excited to partner with RTK to spread the word on potential benefits which conservation easements can provide to producers, rural communities, and the land through the CCGA program," said Karen Woodrich, State Conservationist.

Landowners in western Kansas will now have the option to enhance, increase and protect grassland through habitat this project with conservation easements. RTK's role will be to build new relationships with ranchers to initiate dialogue between landowners conservation partners.

Woodrich said, "Through

agreement, NRCS will be working with four non-federal partners, led by RTK, to provide outreach about the opportunities available to producers to protect and ensure their lands are healthy and productive for future generations."

This project will grow long-term project capacity and will help transition RTK from a regional to a statewide land trust. This work will take RTK to the next level of conservation and expand the footprint rations who are concerned about of conservation easements. \*\*


